# Norfolk Library and Information Service working with Schools

Norfolk Libraries would like to continue support schools and to encourage children to access books and other services in their libraries.

It's free for anyone in Norfolk to join a library and for children under 16 there are no overdue charges. Children can take home up to 15 books and use the online eCatalogue to borrow digital eBook and eAudio titles too.

If they can't find something on the shelves, children can request and reserve any book free of charge to collect from their local branch. Borrowers can search the library catalogue directly themselves or ask a member of staff to help, particularly if they're unable to locate what they need. The library homework collection includes curriculum texts covering a wide range of topics all to support young readers with their after school studies.

For those who home school their children, there's a Home Educators card which entitles the borrower to take home 20 items including up to 12 junior non-fiction titles.

Library branches are also once again able to facilitate class visits and are currently getting ready to launch this year's Summer Reading Challenge so do get in touch with your local library if you would like more information about either of these.

There are also plans to send a newsletter for schools to help send updates about upcoming programmes and offers including events and activities taking place in branch, plus any additional information about support available for school libraries.
